With Christmas just around the corner, lots of children will be receiving presents that require batteries.


Button batteries in particular can pose a high risk if swallowed. To read more about the dangers of button batteries and the symptoms in those children who may have swallowed one, click [here](#).

All children, regardless of their circumstances, **are entitled to an efficient, full time education** which is suitable to their age, ability, aptitude and any special educational needs they may have. Research shows that children who are missing education are at greater risk of underachieving, becoming victims of abuse or neglect and becoming NEET (Not in Education, Employment or Training) in later life. With the festive season often meaning that families are staying over in relatives or friend's homes it is important to make sure that you are sharing information with the families you work with around the importance of providing a **safe sleeping** space for baby. Babies should be put to sleep on their back with their feet at the foot of the crib, cot or pram. This helps to reduce the risk of sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS).
